



Opening remarks by Lucinda Barry, Organ and Tissue Authority Chief Executive Officer

Network Engagement Meeting, 2-3 June, 2022

Reflecting on where we have come from - the national program has been a great success.

Rarely do you see such significant reform done well between the Commonwealth and the States — and then for the clinical program to be implemented across 95 hospitals is outstanding.

As you can see (in the graph above), within 10 years of the announcement, the number of organ donors had more than doubled. This is because of DonateLife!

And the outcome of this has seen the number of transplants increasing, with more than 1550 people receiving a transplant in 2019.

There are nearly 16,000 people who have received a transplant since 2009.

I know sometimes the focus seems to be just on the numbers — and yes, we have had a 25% decrease in organ donation during the last two years due to the pandemic.

But I stand here so proud of what was achieved over the past two years.

Due to all of your dedication and commitment, we were able to navigate the challenges, continue to make sure people had the chance to be a donor where possible, support families, continue to raise community awareness and achieve the greatest number of registrations last year.

Faced with some great challenges, the program kept going during the pandemic.

Everyone played a part in this, both those in the network and at the OTA — our medical and nursing staff, support and office staff, and the of course the Leadership team.

Our purpose

I believe the key to this success has been the commitment by everyone who works for DonateLife – to our purpose.


